Pupil Premium Impact and Evaluation Report Academic Year 2016/17

Context of Academy

Weelsby is a large primary academy with 330 pupils currently on roll, ranging from Nursery to Year 6. According to Raise on Line 2016 the school deprivation indicator is higher than the national average (top 20%). The stability of the school population is decreasing and there is an increased level of transiency. In 2014 the stability was 82.7% compared to 85.9% nationally. However in 2016 this had changed to 72.9%. This change in stability means that pupils are currently being Admitted on a weekly basis, many of whom are vulnerable; have challenging behaviour or are working below national expectations.

The majority of families are white British. Only 8.4 % of pupils are from ethnic minority backgrounds compared to 30.7% nationally and only 6.3% of pupils' first language is not English compared to 19.5% nationally.

Raise on Line 2016 showed that a high percentage of pupils were eligible for free school meals (61.3 % compared to 25.2% nationally.) 135 are currently entitled to pupil premium. According to Raise on Line 2016 the percentage of pupils with SEND support is well below the national average of 12.1 % at 7.3%.

Objectives of Pupil Premium Spending

- To continue to provide all children with high quality teaching and learning experiences.
- To continue to use targeted intervention and support to close the attainment gap between disadvantaged and other pupils and ensure that the majority of children are achieving age related expectations.
- To develop the curriculum to engage all learners, develop independence, resilience, collaboration and provide challenge.
- To provide a range of extra- curricular activities which all children can access.
- To provide a range of quality first hand experiences to raise aspirations, engage children in their learning and expose them to the world around them.
- To ensure that children are ready to learn.
